“You’re Being An Angel”

Hanif Qadir was born in Thornaby-on-Tees in Northern England. He moved with his family to Walthamstow, a town in Northeast London, when he was fourteen. He still lives there with his wife and three children. With his brothers, Imtiaz and Abad, the siblings operated very successful businesses in textiles, taxi services, and motor vehicle garages.

Then one day in 2002, Hanif traveled to Afghanistan via Pakistan to become a jihadi. He and his brothers had become “seduced by the false blandishments of extremist ‘recruiters’ who were (and still are) active” in their neighbourhood.

Instead of recruiting Hanif, the Mujahideen unknowingly opened up Hanif’s spiritual eyes to the horrors they were committing. He returned to England a changed man. He converted his brothers away from extremism and starting in 2003, with their friend Mike Jervis, they began to divert others away from extreme Islam.
